




Finally, as some of us return to work and some sense of normality, we hope you all keep safe, keep well and above all keep looking out for each other.



Youth Landscapers Update

Staying creative during lockdown

Local creative explorers, the Youth Landscapers, have been making projects and artwork together since 2016. They are supported by the National Forest, through the Black to Green initiative and involve young people aged 12-18 from Donisthorpe, Moira

Because of the global Covid-19 emergency, Youth Landscapers aren't able to meet in person and we're not able to continue working on our 2020 Timber project, The Telling of the Bees. Not only are we unable to research, respond and make together but we're also not able to share it with our friends in the National Forest at Timber Festival which

has, understandably, also been postponed until next year. However, Rebecca and Jo, the artists who support the collective, have been thinking about ways we can all stay creative, and continue to look in detail and reflect on our surroundings in the National Forest, where we are all lucky enough to live. Together we've planned a project called The View from My Window.

Together, we will create a series of weekly, small, creative assignments. We will each have a go at completing the mini-project in our own way, recording what we make and sharing our outcomes together online. We'll try some new stuff but also draw on activities we've already developed together, such as our 'Say What You See' method for describing the view in our podcasts, interviewing each other and different forms of photography to practice our creative research skills.

Each week the photo or audio of the results will go online via Facebook, Instagram and a new blog on our website, creating a gallery for people to follow. We will use what we do to make a new episode of our Listening to the Land podcast and hopefully stay in

touch with all our friends across the National Forest and beyond by doing so.

Let's Make Our Village Safe! We can all do our bit to reduce the risk. Here are some tips on how we can deter criminals and ensure Donisthorpe is not seen as an easy target:

- Lock Up! Make sure doors, windows, sheds and gates are locked. Get padlocks if you haven't got them. Lock bikes, scooters etc away in sheds and use your bike lock to secure them to something.
- ⇒ <u>Secure your housel</u> Lock all windows and doors, set burglar alarms if you have them and use lights and sound wherever possible, whether you are in or out!
- Mark your property! Use UV pens or the smart water system.
- ⇒ <u>Do not leave valuables on display!</u> Put away laptops, ID documents, phones and tablets so that people cannot see them through windows.
- Lock cars at all times! DO NOT leave valuables in cars, even if they are not on display.
