This month's Parish Council agenda reflected a change in season as we prepare not only for the winter months, but the following spring - from bulb planting to new village planters and the refurbishment and upkeep of communal areas, to ensure everyone in the Parish has something to look forward to in these challenging times. Any support in planting the bulbs and maintaining the village planters would be very welcome.

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Join your Parish Council!

What is a Parish Council?

A Parish Council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the Parish. It is the level of local government closest to the community.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

Become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support. A community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve.

What decisions do Parish Councils make?

Parish Councils make all kinds of decisions on issues that affect the local community. The most common topics are planning matters, crime prevention and roads & highways.

How much time does it take up?

Councils usually meet once a month for the council meeting to which members of the public are also invited. Meetings may last two or three hours, depending on what is on the list of items to discuss. We have some sub-committees to deal with specific subjects, such as planning matters, leisure centre and project based groups.

How long does a Parish Councillor serve for?



Once elected, Parish Councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years. This does not mean that you have to stay for four years. If you find it is not for you, or you can no longer meet the commitment, you can stand down.

Am I eligible to be a Parish Councillor?



To stand for election on a Parish Council, you must:

be at least 18 years old.

be an elector of the Parish; or

in the past 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the Parish; or work in the Parish (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the Parish boundary.

Are you interested in becoming a Parish Councillor?

Come to a Parish Council meeting. Council meets every second Wednesday of the month at Oakthorpe Community Leisure Centre 7.30pm.


Defibrillator Training Sessions

Cardiac arrest – how you can help save a life with simple first aid in the vital minutes before the ambulance arrives.



If a relative, friend or neighbour collapsed and stopped breathing would you know what to do? Come along to a demonstration by St John Ambulance who will explain what happens from when you call 999 to when the ambulance crew takes over. It's simple, anyone can do it and if it happens for real the ambulance service call handler will be coaching you on what to do.

These demonstrations will allow you to hear it first hand from our experienced volunteers who have dealt with cardiac arrests. They will talk you through making the 999 call, what you and others can be doing to increase the person's chances of survival and what happens when the ambulance arrives.
